Basic Requirements:

Research Note Format: *Formal Summary*

For each source you use, you should have research notes in the following format:

1. Citation: Cite completely using MLA format
2. Summary: Summarize the main points this source made about your topic in one full paragraph. Make sure this is IN YOUR OWN WORDS!
- Bullet Points
3. Evaluation: Explain how this source will help you to develop your project. You might discuss any of the following... *Paragraph form*
 - a. Interesting information you learned
 - b. How this connects to your previous research
 - c. What insight this gives you into your research topic
 - d. New ideas you now have for your project
 - e. Other...?
